

ADMISSIONS BY KARL HAU.

Case Against Him Appears Strong—
Trial to Begin July 17.

KARLSRUHE, July 11.—As July 17, the day set for the opening of the trial of Prof. Karl Hau of George Washington University, Washington, D. C., approaches, the newspapers are beginning to show keen interest in the case, summarizing the evidence so far as it is known.

In view of the fact that publications have contained numerous errors, the State's Attorney to-day published a statement which makes the case against the prisoner appear much stronger than hitherto. He says Hau admits traveling Nov. 3 from London to Frankfort, disguised with a false beard, and also acknowledges having a second beard made at Frankfort, with which he went to Baden-Baden Nov. 6, the day of the murder. Hau further admits telephoning to Frau Mollitor, having previously hovered in the vicinity of her house, but he refuses to divulge the purpose of his disguise and evades the crucial question as to whether he murdered his mother-in-law, neither affirming nor denying the crime. He admits that he left Baden-Baden on the 6:30 P. M. train Nov. 6 for Frankfort, where he took the Ostend express on his way to London.

The State's Attorney says Frau Mollitor left property valued at \$250,000.
